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NEW ORLEANS POLL

-- FINAL TOPLINE --

February 18-26, 2006

Results are based on telephone interviews with -804—adults aged 18 and older who are currently living in the city of New Orleans, conducted February 18-26, 2006. For results based on the total sample of current New Orleans residents, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of sampling error is ±4 percentage points.

For results based on the -399—New Orleans residents in the Form A half-sample and -405—New Orleans residents in the Form B half-sample, the maximum margins of sampling error are ± 5 percentage points.

Respondents were contacted on land line telephones and cellular telephones. The sample was weighted to adjust for the respondents' probability of being included in the sample based on the number of working telephone lines they have and the number of people who use each of those lines.

In addition to sampling error, question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of public opinion polls.
