



Interviews with 1,008 adult Americans conducted by telephone by Opinion Research Corporation on January 19-21, 2007. The margin of sampling error for results based on the total sample is plus or minus 3 percentage points and for results based on half-samples is plus or minus 4.5 percentage points.
