

## Conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center

Interviews with 508 adults in New Hampshire conducted by telephone on September 17-24, 2007. The margin of sampling error for results based on the total sample is plus or minus 4.3 percentage points.

Additional interviews were conducted to increase the number of respondents who plan to vote in the 2008 presidential primaries. A total of 324 who say they plan to vote in the Republican presidential primary were interviewed. The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 5.5 percentage points.
